## Cymbeline – The story so far

Some twenty years before the play starts, a British nobleman, Belarius, was wrongly exiled for treason by Cymbeline the King of the Britons. He took his revenge by stealing the king's two sons, Guiderius and Arviragus.

Since that time Cymbeline has remarried. His second wife is determined that her son, Cloten, should marry the king's remaining child, his daughter Imogen. The princess has, however, to her father's fury, secretly married Posthumus Leonatus, an orphan brought up at court by the king. The play begins immediately after Cymbeline's sentence of exile on Posthumus.

Meanwhile, the Roman Emperor, Augustus Caesar, has sent his general, Caius Lucius, to demand a renewal of tribute from the Britons. If Britain doesn't pay the tribute, there will be war...

**Director's Note** 

Cymbeline has always been one of my favourite Shakespeare plays, with intricate poetry and dramatic situations that push characters (and performers) beyond what they thought possible. The plot and tone fluctuate wildly, the time period oscillates from the Renaissance to Ancient Rome, and in a moment love turns to despair while camaraderie turns deadly. For Shakespeare's original audience, however, none of this would have been a contradiction. This is a play all the more thrilling because it has both passion and humour, lust and love, history and serendipity. Our hope is that setting the play in an 'original' setting will free the energy that its original audience felt, and help us recapture it, together.

We know that in Shakespeare's time the London companies would tour right here to York. While there aren't specific records about *Cymbeline*, the traditional guild hall setting gave us the opportunity to explore what any touring show might have looked like. The Renaissance aesthetic also allowed us to explore the play's fraught gender roles, as Shakespeare's original company would have been all-male, with boys and men playing all the parts. We are presenting the play with a mixed-gender company portraying strict male and female roles, exploring definitions of gender in Shakespeare's time and today.

Ultimately, *Cymbeline* is a thrilling, funny, and poignant play that gets performed all too rarely in its full glory. We hope you enjoy it!
